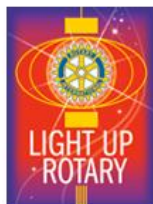

January 8 Program Amy Lintner - Local UI Student

Amy Grew up in Council Bluffs. She attended St. Albert and graduated from Underwood High School.

She works in the admissions office at the University of Iowa. She loves the school so it's easy to be its cheerleader.

Amy's quest to find a school began when she attended Girls State. She saw how good community leaders work to shape good communities and wanted to go somewhere where she could learn those skills. She also wanted to continue as an athlete - she played volleyball and basketball in high school. She was recruited by some smaller schools but she wanted to attend a Big 10 school. She applied at the University of Iowa and was accepted. She also received some scholarships. She was pre-med with majors in human physiology and Spanish (she is fluent).

Amy was a small fish in a big sea and lost her way for awhile. She returned home to volunteer and explore her interests. She decided to return to the University and changed her major to global health studies. After graduation she plans to continue in school to become a PA and focus on rural pediatrics. UNMC has a great program and it's local. She loves the area and wants to return.

Amy has had many opportunities at the University of Iowa that she couldn't have had anywhere else. She has found the key to her success - be involved - less sleep, more doing. She volunteers for Dance Marathon to support the fight against pediatric cancer. She is especially passionate about providing family support as part of the program. She also works at a mobile clinic that gives free care to the uninsured and underserved.
